## **THE CIVIL WAR: JUNE 1864**

In early May 1864 the Federal Army of the Potomac, General Ulysses S. Grant commanding, crosses the Rapidan River on its drive to capture Richmond, and enters an area known as the Wilderness. Within this tangled scrub oak thicket waits General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. Lee knows the difficult terrain will slow Grant's progress, neutralize his artillery, and offset the 2-1 Federal numerical advantage. At a high cost in casualties, the Confederates halt the Federal advance.

Next, Grant orders a series of movements to outflank Lee and get between Lee's army and Richmond, but each time, at Spotsylvania, the North Anna River, and Cold Harbor, Lee's veterans are able to beat Grant's troops to the next strategic point, entrench, and fight them to a standstill. Finally, unable to break Lee's lines by frontal assault, Grant moves his entire army across the James River to besiege Petersburg and its railroads, threatening Richmond from the South. By mid-June, Lee's soldiers are moving the extensive Petersburg works, reinforcing the home guard. Grant begins testing Lee's defenses, seeking a weak point to break through, and there is fighting all along the line.

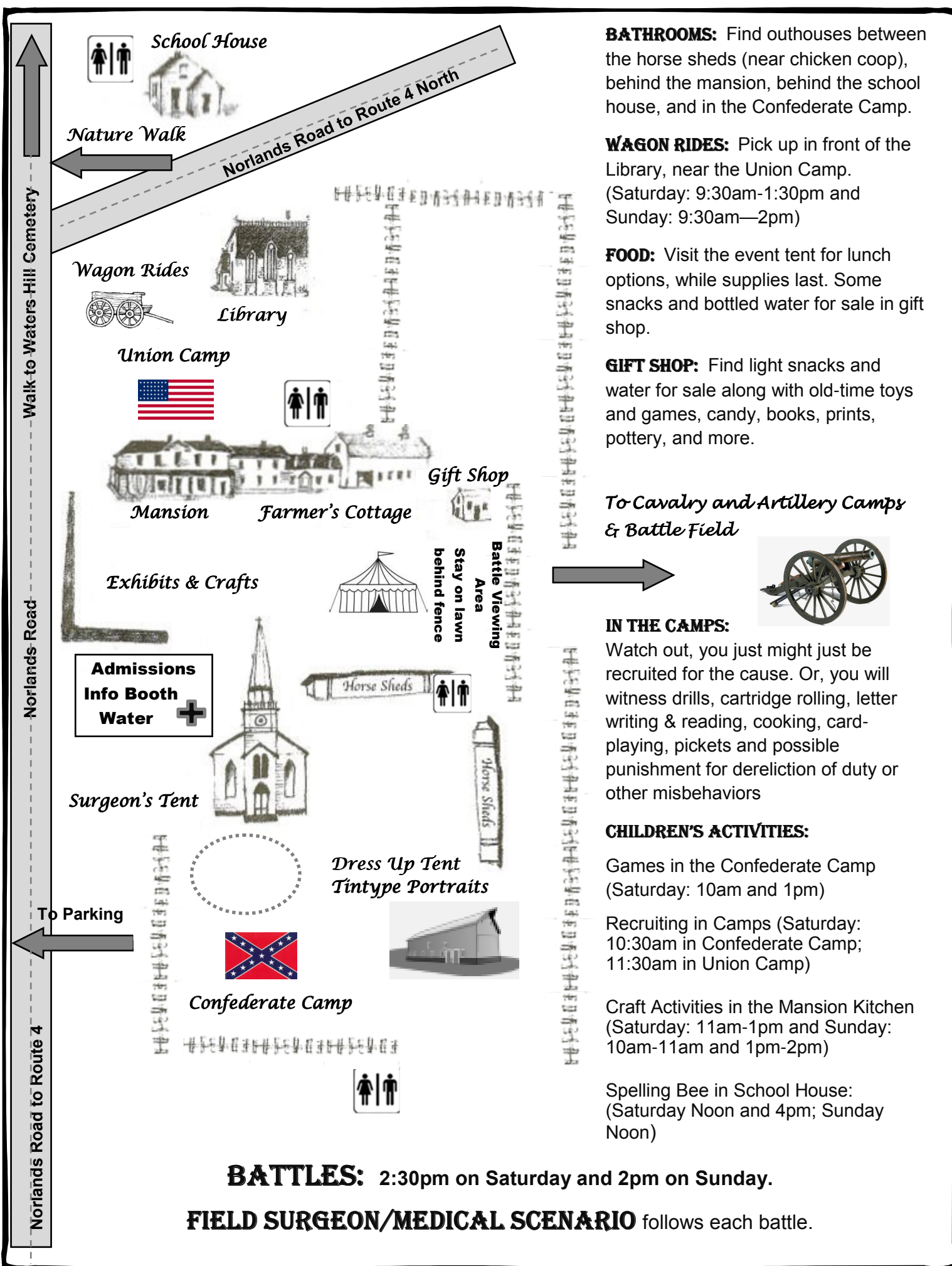
